- 11:45am – Hoop Dance demonstration with Jackson Beardy. Will perform and teach children how to hoop dance.
- 12:45pm – Two children jiggers will perform and teach children to jig.
- 1:30pm – Story time with Mary Black, who will read from *The Seven Teachings* book.
- 2:00pm – Arts and Crafts with Blaine Harris, who will teach children how to make petroforms.

"We wanted to put on an event where families could come out and have some fun together, and also find out more about the Manito Ahbee Festival," says Lisa Meeches, Chair of the Manito Ahbee Board of Governors. "We'll be sharing some of our culture and traditions with children who maybe have never seen an Aboriginal dancer, or heard an Aboriginal story. It's a chance for many kids to experience something brand new."

Manito Ahbee – which means ‘where the Creator sits’ – honours a sacred site in Manitoba’s Whiteshell Provincial Park where Aboriginal people have gathered for hundreds of years to share teachings and wisdom. There are several petroforms at this site including one shaped like a turtle that represents Turtle Island, which is another name for North America. Manito Ahbee was recognized in 2008 with Travel Manitoba’s Tourism Award in the category of Aboriginal Tourism.
